The 52nd Annual Conference of the Research Council on Mathematics Learning (RCML) will be held in **College Station**, **Texas**, at the Hilton College Station & Conference Center, March 6-8, 2025. The purpose of the RCML conference is to share current research in mathematics education and invited potential presenters to submit scholarship that reflects on the past and provides innovative directions for the future of mathematics learning across various disciplines.
